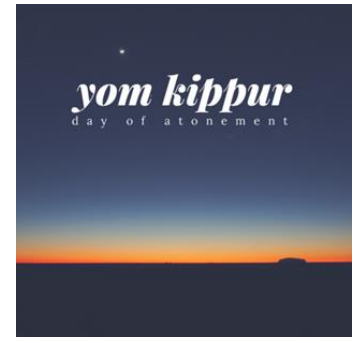

1:30 p.m. Interlude Program with Christine Dietz - in the Loeb Room (downstairs)

During the High Holidays, we focus on teshuvah. Often understood as “repentance” or “atonement,” teshuvah literally means “return.” To what are we returning? “Return means coming back to one’s soul, one’s Divine essence, one’s source in God.” (R. Simon Jacobson, 60 Days, p. 88). Jewish legend teaches that before God created this universe of multiplicity, God created teshuvah, a healing force embedded in all creation that draws all things back to their source in infinite oneness.” (Estelle Frankel, Sacred Therapy, p. 129).

In this Interlude, we will reflect on how we have been impacted by the many disruptive and disturbing events of the past few years and consider how our tradition’s teachings about teshuvah can help us to move toward integration, reconciliation and wholeness as individuals and as a community. Our conversation will be facilitated by Christine Dietz, Ph.D., D.Min., L.I.S.W.

Christine is a licensed independent social worker and spiritual director. She received her M.S.W. from the University of Iowa, her Ph.D. in Sociology from the State University of New York at Buffalo, and her Doctor of Ministry degree in Jewish Spirituality from the Graduate Theological Foundation. She is a graduate of the Lev Shomea Training Program for Spiritual Direction in the Jewish Tradition. She teaches and practices spiritually integrated psychotherapy and offers individual and group spiritual direction to people from all religious and spiritual traditions. She is a member of Tifereth Israel Synagogue.

Calling all Shofarot: We invite people of all ages to bring your shofarot to the Neilah (concluding) service of Yom Kippur, to take part in the final shofar call at the end of the service.

The conclusion of our Neilah service is a beautiful Havdalah service: Havdalah, which most people associate with the separation of the end of Shabbat and the beginning of the new week, is also celebrated at the conclusion of our Yom Kippur services. If you have never joined us for this part of Yom Kippur, please consider being part of this beautiful experience. After the final shofar call, children of all ages will be invited to the bimah. The lights will be dimmed, and each child will receive a special glow light as we prepare to sing the blessings of Havdalah and say Hamotzi. Everyone is then invited to proceed to the social hall for Break the Fast.

If you are fasting on Yom Kippur and you begin to feel lightheaded or woozy, please know that emergency snacks, water and juice will be available in the Temple kitchen. They will be **specially marked for this purpose**. Judaism's value of saving a life and maintaining health supercedes all customs and mitzvot such as fasting. Please be sure to assist yourself or have someone help you if you are in distress due to fasting.

Each week we will delve into essential and challenging questions about Judaism and Jewish life. Nothing is *off the table*. Bring your questions and Rabbi Neal will bring his for a wide-ranging exploration of topics including: What does Judaism say about an afterlife? What is keeping kosher all about and why would a modern, rational person have any interest in it? Can you be Jewish without believing in God? Do denominations matter? What is this Talmud thing I keep hearing about? Who cares about Israel?

Participate as a series, or one week at a time as free-standing sessions. Appropriate for all levels of Jewish knowledge and involvement (including for those who are exploring or becoming Jewish).
