Rabbi's Message

What does Jewish summer camp have to do with the Book of Numbers?

I have just returned from a three-day visit to Goldman Union Camp Institute (GUCI) in Zionsville, Indiana, and I have to say, there's nothing quite like Jewish summer camp! All the clichés apply – camp has a magical quality about it; the friendships are forever; a day at camp feels like a week in regular life; Jewish camp is one of the best ways to build a strong Jewish identity. But these aren't actually clichés, they are the truths and realities of camp.

Many of you may not need to be sold on the benefits of Jewish summer camp, but it is worth a review and reminder of some of them: gaining in Jewish learning, knowledge, identity, and experiences are some of the obvious benefits. But wait, there's more! Going to camp helps build self-reliance and independence. No one is cutting your food, making your bed, or cleaning up after you. Even though campers are constantly with counselors and staff, kids learn to do for themselves in a way they don't often have to at home or school. Camp strengthens kids by pushing them to push themselves and deal with challenges. Camp life is not bubble-wrapped. It's real, gritty, and sometimes even involves scrapes, bug-bites, cabin drama, activities kids don't feel like doing, and food they may not like. What a gift!

This may seem like an odd way to praise the value of camp, but as powerful as the positive experiences of camp are, the challenges are (at least) as important. When a kid doesn't like the meal, no one is there to act as a short order cook and make them what they want. They always have the option of a sun-butter and jelly sandwich (no peanut butter sandwich, of course), but they have to make it themselves. If a kid gets a scrape, a splinter, or slips in the mud, one of the greatest gifts is the realization that they can survive it.

Some love, attention, and maybe a patching-up, then they are back on their way to activities with friends. That's how kids become strong and resilient. And when you've got a dozen or more kids living in a cabin together, there's bound to be some drama – what a



great opportunity to develop conflict resolution skills in a real-life setting. This summer, the campers at GUCI even got to experience a two-and-a-half-day power outage, and not only were they just fine, it's one of the first and most exciting stories they want to tell about their time at camp.

Jewish summer camp not only strengthens Jewish identity, it also strengthens independence, resilience, and the ability to overcome obstacles. Sorry, no data, it's just anecdotal, but I've been watching the phenomenon for years, and it's pretty remarkable. Especially when campers become college students. In my thirteen years working with college students, I saw kids who went to camp adapt far more easily to the often-overwhelming transition to college life.

So what does this have to do with the Book of Numbers? At the beginning of the Book of Numbers in the Torah, God instructs Moses to "lift up their heads" and count the Children of Israel, and to arrange them by tribe, with each Israelite standing — ish al diglo — each under the banner of their ancestral house. They are all Israelites, but they also have a narrower group identity. From within the greater whole, they each stand under the flag of where they have come from.

The Midrash portrays Moses as being worried about these flags. Won't these subdivisions lead to conflict between different groups? But God reassures Moses continued on page 3 >



that these families, these tribes and their flags, will actually help the people find their place in the world, to know who they are and where they come from.

As an odd counterpoint to arranging people by their group membership, is the particular language of the census. God does not tell Moses to count heads, but, rather, to lift up the heads of each of them. To lift up the head is to see the face. To see the face is to encounter the individuality of each and every person who is being counted.

The total number of Israelites was composed of different tribes, and the tribes were made up of different ancestral houses, each with their own banner. But at the heart of everything, was the uniqueness of each individual – lift up the faces!

It turns out that one of the important ingredients for truly being an individual, is being part of something bigger than yourself. It's an odd contradiction, but the knowledge and security that comes from belonging, actually liberates us to be our own unique selves. All the more so with kids.

At camp, kids know they belong, and that frees them to simply be who they are. Back in the so-called real world, belonging is far more tenuous and the pressures to conform and meet expectations of social groups can weigh heavy on them. But, at camp, they get to experience one of the few settings where "you be you" is genuinely possible.

Jewish summer camp is one of the most thriving areas of American Jewish life, and one of the most profound ways of having a positive, Jewish impact on the next generation, which makes this seem like a natural place to ask for something.

If you know a young person who is of camp age, you can encourage them to go. If you have a kid, a grandkid, a niece or a nephew, you can even offer to send them to camp. If you simply want to help families to afford camp, by all means, please contribute to TBJ's camp scholarship fund. And if you want to know more about Jewish summer camp, I'd love to talk about it. Or, better yet, ask one of the campers when they get home. Like Moses taking the census, it will lift up their heads, and you will see in their faces just how much it means to them.

As we enter the high holidays of our 150th year, one item of note. Earlier this summer our 30-ton air conditioner that cools the sanctuary and part of the social hall, breathed its last breath. Its sudden demise was completely unexpected, but given that it was approximately 25 years old, it was not surprising. What has been a surprise is that current supply chain issues dictate that a new one will not be available for us until November. From now until then when weather and temperature permit, we will continue to use the sanctuary for Friday night services; if temperatures rise to uncomfortable levels services will move to the small chapel on the lower level where there is still air conditioning.

Where this presents a real challenge is High Holiday services. We all know that September weather in lowa can either feel like summer or winter, and almost 200 people in the sanctuary raise the temperature higher regardless of the weather outside. Therefore, out of an abundance of caution and to ensure the comfort and safety of our congregants and service leaders, we are making arrangements to hold High Holiday services in an alternate space. All high holiday services this year will take place at Caspe Terrace in the auditorium with overflow seating in Bookey Lodge

with a livestream. All services will also be streamed on our website as usual for remote viewing.

It is difficult to imagine Temple B'nai Jeshurun High Holidays somewhere other than our sanctuary, but we are fortunate to have a viable alternative, and grateful to the Jewish Federation for their generosity and cooperation. This will mean, however, that we are not able to have the traditional high holiday meals after services, except for a simple oneg after Erev Rosh Hashanah services. While it is unfortunate we cannot kibbitz and nosh after services like we usually do, hopefully this is an opportunity to get together in smaller groups at our homes. We appreciate your understanding and accommodation during this unique

situation this year. To modify what we say at Passover, "next year back at TBJ!"

The complete high holiday schedule is available in this bulletin, on our Temple website and in emails that will go out beginning in late August.

HISTORIC TIDBITS

From Iowa State Register April 2, 1874
The anniversary feast of Passover
occurs today. It has been observed
by our Hebrew brethren. In addition to
the regular Passover service the scroll
was brought into the synagogue of the
reformed Jews for the first time today.
There being no regular rabbi in city,
Mr. (Ludwig) Samish officiated as such.

From Iowa State Leader July 29, 1925: The funeral of Mr. Samish who died suddenly yesterday morning, took place this afternoon and was largely attended. It was conducted by a rabbi in person. Mr. Samish was the first adult Hebrew who has died in Des Moines. He leaves a wife and children well provided for.

From Iowa State Register Aug. 30, 1878: Congregation B'nai Yeshurun purchases the property at the corner of 7th and Mulberry Streets and will immediately fit it up for a synagogue.

Executive Director's Message

As many of you may know, the past twelve months were very difficult for my family and me. Last July, after I had surgery to repair a hernia, I received a call from the hospital that my older brother had a stroke. Unfortunately, it was a severe ischemic stroke and he lost most of his motor function on his right side. He is doing much better now, but he still needs significant help. In December, my mother had a hemorrhagic stroke, and we had to move her to a skilled care facility. We just recently sold her home that she shared with my blind stepfather. Then, in January my biological father, who had been living in assisted living, had an ischemic stroke and we had to move him into skilled care as well.

Most of the care for my family has fallen on me, as the youngest child still living in the immediate area. At times it has felt like having another full-time job. This fiscal year I asked the board if they would, in lieu of, a raise grant me an extra day off to take care of my family. I cannot tell you how grateful I am that the board granted my request.

I will be in the office Tuesday through Friday during normal business hours, and I will be out of the office on Mondays to help take my family to appointments and run errands for them. I will be at the Temple on Saturday mornings to help set up services and run the AV equipment. There will be some weeks where that extra day off will need to shift from Monday to another day based on the needs of the Temple or of my family. For example, if there is an event taking place on a Monday, I would be more than happy to shift my schedule. Again, I am so grateful to the board for granting this request and feel privileged to work for an organization that understands the importance of caring for your family.

Also, you likely have already read Emily's article and know about the air conditioner for the

sanctuary. Thankfully, the first half of July was relatively cool, and we have been able to hold services in our sanctuary without much issue. One of the reasons we have been able to do this is because of the generosity of the Lacher and Goldman families. They



donated many of the fans we have used to help keep the sanctuary and social hall comfortable. Unfortunately, our sanctuary, built in 1932, wasn't designed with modern HVAC systems in mind and so we must wait until November for one of the largest AC units you can purchase to arrive. The unit we have ordered is going to be more energy efficient and we have contacted MidAmerican about rebates in addition to looking at other ways we can offset the cost of this new AC unit.

This issue has not affected the AC of the lower-level offices and small chapel, and certain areas of the upper level, like the kitchen, still have AC. If temperatures rise to a level where people would be uncomfortable in the sanctuary, we will move services to the lower-level chapel that can seat about 50 people at max capacity, and notify the congregation via email, text message, and Facebook. All services will continue to be livestreamed regardless of location. Heating the building has also not been affected by this issue, and we should all be set once colder weather has arrived. Thank you for your understanding on this matter as well. If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to me.




